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AN INTRODUCTION

Throughout time in the Christian Church, ALL SAINTS DAY has been the occasion when we, as a corporate body, look back and remember the saints who have preceded us in death. At Central Lutheran Church, as far back as memory serves, we have marked this Feast Day by remembering those in the parish who have died during the year whilst we sing the great hymn, *For All the Saints Who From Their Labors Rest*, and have read the appointed lessons, prayers and responses of the day.

In early Christian times on All Saints Day, at funerals, and on the anniversary day of the death of a Christian, a specific service was sung or said. *Requiem æternam dona eis* (*Rest eternal grant them*), the first words of the **INTROIT** (Entrance Psalm) from this service, which was taken from Jewish sources and dates from the 2nd century, gives the service its name, **REQUIEM**. Holy Scripture provides the basis for most of the other texts. Zephaniah, one of the final and often ignored books of the Old Testament, serves as a source for many of the more descriptive images regarding the final judgment. The medieval concept of descriptive metaphors and imagery is clearly in evidence in the texts, specifically the **SEQUENCE** text where God is *The King of terrifying Majesty* and *When the accursed are confounded, consigned to the fierce flames*. This same approach, employing dramatic imagery, is also evident in the visual arts of the period. Nowadays, some of the imagery may seem overly dramatic, but one must remember the time period – the accepted belief at this point was that the earth was flat, and the sun journeyed across the sky each day. As humankind has gained more knowledge, we have taken a more rational approach (we believe) to life, death and the final judgment. Likewise, our metaphors and visual arts have changed.

These early Christian texts in this service were first set to plainchant – unaccompanied, simple melodies. As one of the earliest examples of notated music, plainchant has exerted a significant influence upon Western Music throughout the centuries.

Throughout the ages, wealthy patrons and congregations frequently marked important occasions by commissioning works of art, whether it be a piece of sculpture, an altar painting, a stained-glass window for their church, or a musical setting of the liturgical service for chorus, soloists and orchestra by a great composer. The body of Requiem masses, of which the Mozart Requiem is one, falls into this category.

A NOTE ABOUT THE COMPOSER AND THE REQUIEM

Born in Salzburg, Austria in 1756, young Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart demonstrated a prodigious musical talent as a child. By age six, his father had dropped all personal ambitions and commenced to take the young prodigy on tour to exhibit his tremendous talents. Young Mozart composed his first symphony before his ninth birthday. During his brief 36 years of life, Mozart composed well

over 600 compositions including symphonies, masses and other church music – mostly for the Archbishop of Salzburg, operas, string quartets, and other music.

A marvelous story illustrates Mozart's extraordinary musical memory. The famous Italian composer of the 16th century, Gregorio Allegri, had composed a motet based upon *Psalm 51* (*Create in Me a Clean Heart, O God*) for the Sistine Chapel Choir at St. Peter's, The Vatican, for Good Friday services. The musical effect of this Psalm setting was so magical that the pope declared after hearing it once that all musical scores for this work would be located in the Vatican vault to preserve this remarkable music exclusively for the Vatican. The edict remained in effect until the precocious Mozart heard the work during a visit to the Sistine Chapel. With his absolute tonal memory, he gleefully notated the music after just one hearing and gave the entire world this great masterpiece.

In 1792, Count Franz von Wallsegg commissioned Mozart to compose a setting of the Requiem. It was the Count's intent to have the work performed in memory of his departed wife and list it as a work that he personally composed. But the Count was unaware when Mozart died that the Requiem remained largely unfinished with only beginning sketches for some sections (*Lacrimosa*) and nothing for the *Sanctus*, *Benedictus*, and *Agnus Dei*. Robert Levin of Harvard University explains, "In order not to forget the handsome commission fee, Mozart's widow Constanze decided to have the work completed in secrecy, so that the finished version could be presented as her husband's final effort. The Requiem is known to the general public in the version undertaken immediately after Mozart's death by his pupil Franz Zaver Sußmayer." Thus, the Requiem had to be completed in great haste in order not to arouse the Count's suspicion.

Finally in 1825, forty-three years following Mozart's death, the "Requiem Controversy" came to light. Constanze Mozart and Sußmayer claimed the final portions of the Requiem were exclusively from the pen of Sußmayer without aid or sketches from Mozart. It seems, however, unlikely that Sußmayer was, as a composer, capable of writing music of this quality without assistance from Mozart. Otherwise, if Sußmayer was a gifted composer, there would have been other later musical compositions credited to his name from which to judge his talent. One can only speculate that Mozart, realizing his imminent departure, discussed or perhaps guided his student, Sußmayer, through the remainder of the work with notes and sketches that were later destroyed while leaving the detail work of orchestration and the completion of some sections to Sußmayer. The history of the Requiem, even today after much scholarship, remains one of the great mysteries of musical history.

The version sung today is the Robert Levin version which was commissioned by Helmuth Rilling and finished in 1993. The American premier of this new version was presented at the Oregon Bach Festival in Eugene and has become a popular alternative to the Sußmayer completion. ~AESC






