Dear Friends,

I imagine many of us are growing weary of hearing the bleak news we're being bombarded with these days, especially in light of the rise in hospitalizations and the spread of the coronavirus attributed to the delta variant. It's hard not to get discouraged. If that rings true for you, I encourage you to read Psalm 121. Notice in the first two verses the psalmist asks and answers his own question: "I lift up my eyes to the hills—from where will my help come? My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth." Notice also that by the end (v. 8) the psalmist provides an assurance of God's protection: "The Lord will keep your going out and your coming in from this time on and forevermore." Pause on that last word—FOREVERMORE.

None of us really knows what our future holds. Or, do we? I encourage all of us who walk as yet by faith to trust in the promises of God. The scriptures are filled with reminders that God is with us and for us... that God will never abandon nor forsake us... that nothing will ever be able to separate us from God's love. And so we continue the walk of faith. Sometimes it may feel like we're on a roller coaster with twists and turns that make our stomachs churn. Yet we press on. Sometimes it may feel like we're caught in a tornado and everything is spinning out of control with no end in sight. Yet we press on. Sometimes we feel: Discouraged... Frustrated... Angry... Overwhelmed. Yet we press on. We press on trusting that God's hand is leading and guiding us each and every step of the way—*FOREVERMORE*.

As we move from summer to fall, our plans for resuming many of our program year fellowship events and activities are being put on hold for a little while longer. And maybe that's okay, at least for now. We won't be kicking off Together Tuesdays in September with a community meal, children's choir, music together, youth and adult education opportunities. Nor will Chorale and handbell rehearsals resume as we had hoped.

However, we will continue to focus on providing opportunities to gather for worship to praise our God: in-person, via live-stream, and on Zoom. Using the hybrid model we've become accustomed to these recent months, we will continue to: gather for bible study, lift up one another in prayer, and provide service opportunities. And we will continue to provide administrative oversight and steward the resources that God has entrusted to this congregation just as we have been doing. I encourage you to continue to look for ways to connect, in ways that feel safe for you and for your household, and most of all to trust that you are loved—*FOREVERMORE*.

"Religion that is pure and undefined before God, the Father, is this: to care for orphans and widows in their distress." James 1:27a

Dear Friends,

The word in James that is translated as "religion" is the Greek word *threskeia* and is actually better translated as "worship." James is saying that what makes pure worship is not just what we do in the sanctuary, but also caring for those who are in need. Here it lists orphans and widows in their distress, but really, it is all those who are in distress – the sick, the needy, those in grief, those in pain.

This past summer I served as a chaplain-intern at Riverbend hospital. I spent my time visiting people in sickness and grief. I had the privilege of meeting with over 200 patients and their families at the hospital from all different walks of life, some of whom had never talked to anyone from a religious perspective at all. My role was to provide emotional and spiritual care to patients. I heard from patients and families what was deep on their heart. Nearly everyone comes into the hospital for something physical, but what is opened up in their life are the emotional struggles and challenges of their lives as well as the joys, hopes, and meanings. Those needs varied widely from strained relationships with family, feeling isolated and abandoned, feeling responsible for their larger family, unsure if they could really have hope, unsure if their faith was really going to hold out, searching for some larger meaning as well as the joys of family and support, the meaning that is in their life, and the value of our identity and telling our stories.

The one thing I didn't have much of in the hospital was frivolous conversation. I didn't hear much about sports or politics, because in the hospital, people were ready to talk about real life. The care they needed was to simply recognize what was on their heart and being able to express it. When they did that, that space was holy. Our time together was, as in James' quote above, worshipful. It wasn't always the entire visit, but there would be moments where the patient and I were really connecting in a deep way. I had the privilege to witness people move from denial of their situation to acceptance, from doubt to faith, from hopelessness to hope. Of course, as a chaplain, I wasn't the one who did that for them – *they* were the ones who found that meaning and hope. I was there to accompany them on their journey. Had I not been there, that spiritual journey probably would not have taken place, but it was their interaction with the divine in those spaces that was what made it worshipful. It was a joy to be present in that space.

I want to thank all of you, members of Central, for allowing me the time to be away at the hospital these past three months. Being present at the hospital full time provided me the space to be truly present there. Second, I want to thank you all members of the Central Foundation which generously funded my time being there, paying my salary so that I could be serving our community of Eugene/Springfield. I reached out to a tremendous number of people that never would have set foot in our church doors. This was the mission of the entire church together.

Pictured with Edie are her parents and her brother, Liam.


PRIDE IN THE PARK

On August 14, Central Lutheran Church returned to Eugene's annual Pride in the Park, this year joined by United and Emmaus, to host a booth in solidarity and celebration. Central, United, and Emmaus are Eugene's three Reconciling in Christ communities, advocating for "the acceptance, full participation, and liberation of all sexual orientations, gender



identities, and gender expressions" in our congregations. With pastoral staff and lay volunteers from all three congregations covering the 7-hour day, we shared information about our churches while distributing rainbow masks, temporary tattoos, stickers affirming God's boundless love, and bubbles for kids of all ages. The collaboration was a lot of fun - participants are all set to do it all again next year!

Mid-week Worship Opportunity via Zoom Wednesday, Sept 22nd at 12:30pm God in the midst of destruction: wildfires & natural disasters



In September of 2020, Oregon suffered the worst fire season in its recorded history. It burned more than a million acres. thousands of homes, and at least 11 people lost their lives. At one point, the largest fires in the state were burning three acres per second. Thousands were evacuated and many lost their homes. The destruction of to the state's forests were significant. This year, with the dryness of the Spring, many new fires have started. Fires near Medford, for example, are burning aggressively. While not nearly as bad as it was in Fall 2020, there is tremendous anxiety knowing that the Fall winds are coming and we are unsure what will happen. There is further anxiety that this

could become the "new normal" and that every year we could face this same challenge. Central is thereby dedicating a worship service of lament, hope, and healing from wildfires and natural disasters on Wednesday, September 22 at 12:30pm. Available on Zoom, this will be a time set apart to express to God our grief of what was lost a year ago, our concern about the conditions right now, and our anxieties about what this means for our future. BOOK CLUB RESUMES IN SEPTEMBER

The CLC Book Club will meet using a Hybrid Model* on Monday, Sept. 13, 2021, at 7pm to discuss *The Mabamba Return: A Historical*

Novel by John B. Franz. This book offers not only an historical perspective of Hal Schroeder growing up as a missionary kid in the Congo in the 1960s, but the later challenges of his PTSD from being in the middle of a messy Congolese rebellion and seeing death up close, to his questioning of his Christian faith, and most remarkably the psychological impact on an American growing up in a third world culture which makes him a Third Culture Kid (TCK).

Author John Franz, a classmate of Arlene Dietz at North Eugene HS, has his PhD in sociology and psychology and currently lives in Clovis, CA. He lived four years in the Congo during the 1960s where, among other things, he taught American dependents, managed a dorm for missionary children, and learned to speak Lingala. He has researched the Third Culture Kid extensively. The book is fast moving and fascinating. The discussion will be led by Arlene Dietz.


