FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR BEN

"And [Abram] believed the Lord; and the Lord reckoned it to him as righteousness." Gen. 15:6

Dear family of God at Central,

This month, amidst all that is going on at Central, I'd like to highlight some opportunities for Adult Parish Education coming to you.

Many of you were able to attend (either in person or joining from home via the livestream) the Chi Rho Lectures, "'I Believe, Help My Unbelief:' (Re-)Discovering Faith in Moments of Crisis" by Rev. Dr. Dennis Lindsay a few weeks ago. In it, Dr. Lindsay urged us to think carefully about what we think about "faith" and "belief" and argued that a Biblical understanding of faith can be very helpful in the face of so much doubt and unbelief (and that these are not the same thing!).

One of Dr. Lindsay's major points was that a Biblical understanding of faith was an active engagement with God, and not belief "in" particular propositions – for example you see the passage from Genesis above where Abram (later to be renamed Abraham) believed the Lord. It is worthy of note that Abram believes the Lord, not things about the Lord. It is a term of relationship and engagement rather than one doctrine over another. To be sure, there still is room for good teaching and understanding about God, but when we look to the core of faith itself, it might be something else. We all have been charged to believe God as actively engaged with God. This was just one insight from the Chi Rho Lectures. It was a deep weekend that came at us very quickly. I'd like to invite you to spend time engaging with the Lectures more deeply. Our Tuesday night Adult Education series will be spent watching short portions of the Chi Rho Lectures, then having the majority of the time to break down some of what was said, and most notably, apply it to our own faith lives. Please join us!

Additionally, in Parish Education, our Sunday Morning Series beginning November 10 will be surrounding the hymns we sing during the season of Advent and Christmas. We will be spending the month of November on Sunday mornings preparing ourselves for the Advent and Christmas seasons to come!

I encourage all who can to attend.

CUE MS/HS YOUTH GROUP SCHEDULE:


Our Youth Group is growing and we are expanding our programming to better meet the needs of our Youth. Our schedule this fall is as follows:

Hearing God by Dallas Willard

How can we be sure that what we think we hear is not our own subconscious? What role does the Bible play? What if what God says to us is not clear? The key, says bestselling author Dallas Willard, is to focus not so much on individual actions and decisions as on building our personal relationship with our Creator. In this beloved classic, which now includes a foreword by James Bryan Smith, you'll gain rich spiritual insight into how we can hear God's voice clearly and develop an intimate partnership with God in the work of God's kingdom.





The CLC Book Club will meet via Zoom on Monday, Nov. 11, 2024, at 7:00pm to discuss *Crossing the Plains* with Bruno by Annick Smith. Annick Smith has written a memoir of a road trip to visit her 97-year-old mother in Chicago. She drives with her dog Bruno from her home outside of Missoula, MT, across the Plains, to Chicago, and then to their family cabin in Sawyer on the east coast of Lake Michigan. She writes about the small towns she drives through, Chicago, and the family cabin in

The Church Council met on Sept. 18, 2024

Treasurer's Report: (see last page)

Action Items:

- **HVAC Contract:** Council approved the recommendation from the Property Committee to sign a contract with Mike's Heating and Air to maintain CLC HVAC systems for \$7,150. This results in over \$10,000 in savings from Central's previous HVAC contract.
- **New President:** New Council President, Debra Knebel will be added to the Oregon Secretary of State Corporate Division 2024 Annual Report, and outgoing Council President, Jean Clancey will be removed.
- **Columbarium Management:** Chuck Swenson will assume managerial responsibility for the Columbarium, with the title of Manager of the CLC Columbarium. The council thanked Joanne Miksis who previously served in this capacity for many years.
