Dear Easter People,

Easter People! That is what we are! We are Easter People, people on the move. And right now we moving ever closer to the joy of Easter—soon to be evident in the plans already underway to return to many of our beloved traditions and celebrations here at Central as well as in our daily lives. Indeed, God is making all things new! There are signs of new life all around us in the budding trees and daffodils bursting from beneath the earth and the joyful sound of birds chirping as they soar.

Speaking personally, I don't recall a time in my life when I've anticipated the joy of celebrating Easter more than I am in the year of our Lord 2022! Why? Because as Easter People, we are nothing if not people of hope. And hope comes to those who wait for the Lord. More importantly, we are Easter People, people of hope because God's promises are trustworthy and true and our God is always about making all things new—bringing to fruition hope from despair, joy from sorrow, life from death.

Soon will we gather to celebrate the Resurrection of Our Lord with the sound of joyful voices singing, "Jesus Christ Is Risen Today." All our senses—taste, touch, smell, sight, sound—will be filled to overflowing. Taste and see the goodness of the Lord. Touch one another with a greeting of peace. Smell the fragrant lilies that have replaced the stench of death. Behold the beauty that surrounds us as we look into one another's eyes. Open your ears (and hearts) to hear the word of God. Then shout, Easter People. Shout with joy:

Alleluia! Christ is Risen! Christ is Risen indeed! Alleluia!

"Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus" Phil 2:5

Our midweek Lenten series this year has been entitled "At the name of Jesus" reflecting on the Christ hymn in Philippians 2:6-11. That hymn, though, is prefaced with the verse above – Let the same mind be in us that is in Christ Jesus. The hymn then goes on to describe Jesus' humiliation, obedience, death, and his exaltation as one whose name is above every name with every knee bending and tongue confessing that Jesus Christ is Lord.

Paul, however, does not write this hymn merely to provide information about Jesus' life. Instead, this is an ethical charge – "let the same mind be in you." In fact, in the previous several verses before this hymn, Paul has been encouraging the congregation at Philippi to be in harmony with each other – "be of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind" (2:3) rather than selfishness and divisiveness (2:4). When Paul writes this Christ hymn we have been reflecting upon during Lent, he is doing so in order to strengthen a congregation into unity and love with one another.

The way the Christ hymn, which is very much about the work and person of Christ, speaks ethically is because of the expansiveness of Christ. To be of the same mind of Jesus is to embrace those moments of the humiliation and pain of Jesus as well as the moments of exaltation and glory. We become of the same mind of Christ not because we can think like Jesus, but instead, because Jesus' incarnation made him fully human in every aspect of life. When we are suffering, when we are in pain, Jesus is there. When we are in joy and delight, Jesus is there too.

Being in the mind of Christ is to be in the whole gamut of our experiences. During Lent when we focus on our own mortality and the death of Jesus, especially as we approach Holy Week with Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, we see Christ in our lives in the places of pain and grief – showing that there is no distance too great for God to reach us. But also being in the same mind of Christ is to move into Easter as we celebrate and rejoice God's glory in the world, that is part of being in the mind of Christ as well. What's more, after Easter when we focus on Care for Creation on our observation of Earth Day at the end of April, when we recognize the bounty of the earth for us and our calling to be stewards of the earth, we will be again remaining in the mind of Christ who lives and reigns among us.

This is what it means to be the hands and feet of Jesus as our mission calls us to be - to abide among one another in the mind of Christ, being Christ to each other as means of grace to one another in our life together as a community of saints.

Youth v. Gov Film Screening

Highlights from Church Council

Church Council met Wednesday, March 16 at 6:30pm via Zoom. Below are some of the highlights from the meeting:

Action items

Approval of a second three-year term on the Endowment Committee for Kelly Colvin-Smith and Doug Martin. (Terms will be completed June 30, 2024.)

Approval of the recommendation by the Endowment Committee to allocate the available Funds from the Perpetual Fund earnings of \$34,152 for the following purposes:

Organizational/Administrative Support and Coordination

Communication Services and Supplies

Volunteer Engagement/Coordination of Ministry Teams

Approval of the recommendation of the Personnel Committee to affirm Ricardo Gutierrez Barrera as the Graduate Resident Director (GRD) of Christus House for the 2022-23 academic year.

Date for the June Semi-Annual Meeting was set for June 5, 2022 between services from 9:45am-10:45am.

Treasurer's report: (see back page). The Oregon Synod has provided a grant of \$10,000 in support of Christus House/Campus Ministry which will be allotted in equal monthly payments.

Christus House Solar Panel Project Update: We have received a grant from EWEB of \$6,188 for the project. This will lower the total cost to \$26,312 (funded by a donor). The start date of installation is July 18, 2022.

Vicar Ben was given approval from the Candidacy Committee of the Oregon Synod on 3/10/22 to be ordained in Word and Sacrament Ministry in the ELCA pending completion of his internship.
