FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR LAURIE

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

I'm so grateful our Church celebrates a Season of Easter and not just a day—forty days from Easter Sunday until Ascension, fifty days until Pentecost—an entire season to give thanks and praise to God for the life, death, and resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. And not just a season, but every Sunday of every season, as we gather in worship to celebrate a "mini-Easter," proclaiming through the mystery of faith, "Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again."

Throughout the season of Lent and Holy Week, leading up to the Festival of the Resurrection of Our Lord, and now through the season of Easter, there are so many people who made this year's journey and celebration meaningful for so many members and friends of Central. Our Sunday morning Adult Education hour throughout the rest of the program year will be centered around music. Susan and Ray Wade will be leading a series on Hymnody and Sacred Music with the only interruption on 4/28 when ElRay will be leading a conversation on the Mass that the Chorale will be singing in worship on 5/5. This educational series on Sacred Music will be a wonderful time not only to appreciate the music we sing further, but an opportunity for deep devotional reflection on who God is and how God works through the gift of music in our lives – you won't want to miss it!

The Together Tuesday adult class will be focused around a book study. The book, by Andrew Root and Blair D. This book is about what has happened to churches in America in the 21st century who seem to be in decline, how to faithfully respond, and how we reenact our mission as people of faith. The goal of the book is not an academic study, but a practical conversation about some of these very important topics. I invite all to come to the study and different laypeople will take turns leading conversations of chapters of the book with some guided questions. The books will be provided by the church. Please join us!

Finally, I want to let you know I will continue doing a few things for the church during my leave (largely things I can do from home). My "Theology Bits" educational videos and "Two Minutes Together" devotional videos will continue (many of which were recorded ahead of time), and I will continue to excerpt out the weekly sermons and special music and post them on Central's YouTube channel & Facebook page. God bless all of you as we all see new creation and new life in our various contexts.

BOOK CLUB NEWS

The CLC Book Club will meet via Zoom on Monday, May 13, 2024, at 7:00pm to discuss "Luke the Lakota: Spirits Across Space and Time" by nirtog (Dan Moore). Transported to the 21st Century, Luke, the gospel writer, narrates an unexpected mission, having been sent by the Holy Spirit to help a young Lakota man. Čhanté is on a vision quest in the Black Hills of South Dakota and does not expect to be met by a flesh and



blood guide from ancient times. As Luke accepts this role and provides spiritual wisdom, he also learns about and affirms Lakota spirituality. He must also over-come disorientation as he confronts a world two thousand years ahead his time. Čhanté tells Luke about many events, good and bad, since Jesus walked the earth, including Lakota history. Luke is able to provide some consolation, and together they confront the most difficult spiritual questions facing humankind. As he learns about Luke, and tells Luke about the holy man, Black Elk, Čhanté begins to see great similarities between the two men. The dominant culture surrounding the Lakota reservations, however, is in turmoil. Americans are feeling more and more mistrustful of each other, and dividing themselves into tribes that sometimes see others as mortal enemies. Surely, this situation will not intrude upon the personal relationship between Čhanté and Luke! The discussion will be led by Karie Shorack.

Looking Ahead: The CLC Book Club will meet via Zoom on Monday, June 10, 2024, at 7:00pm to discuss "Our Missing Hearts" by Celeste Ng. Published in 2022, this novel is a reaction to the fears and racism in America following the COVID-19 pandemic. The discussion will be led by Sally Diehm.
