Dear Friends in Christ,

Dear community of faith,

We approach two important days on our church calendar – Reformation Day and All Saints' day. October 31 is our celebration of the Protestant Reformation because it was on Oct 31, 1517 that Martin Luther posted his 95 theses questioning the use of indulgences that began a series of events leading to the Protestant Reformation. Here, 504 years later, several key aspects of the Reformation continue to resonate. Most notably, it was Luther's reading of Paul's letters – such as from Romans 3 above – that opened up salvation by grace rather than by works. Luther was deeply bothered by the medieval quantification of what a "holy life" looked like through various "holy acts" and the way that created a hierarchy of some people being "more holy" than others. Luther rejected all of that. He found in the Gospel that there is no distinction between people – all people are justified by grace equally, and all those in Christ are one community, not divisions of better and worse Christians. Luther insisted that all people are equally saints and sinners at the same time, and all loved and embraced by God through Christ.

The following day, Nov. 1, is All Saints' day. At that time, we recognize all of those near us who have passed on into glory. We grieve the loss of so many loved ones this past year - as a world, a nation, a state, and especially as a church. The day is a time to recognize the whole community of faith which is not just those people we see on Sundays, but also all those who have gone before. In fact, theologically, when we enter in the space of worship, at that time and in that place are all who have ever or ever will worship together into that same space and worshiping the same God. It is also time for those of us who are still alive to grieve as well as to rejoice that we are one community at all times. We can because the saints that are among us are not just those who have died, but also those who are alive – all who are in relationship.

The fact that Reformation Day and All Saints Day come back to back is an accident of history. All Saints day as November 1 goes back to at least as early as the year 835. Reformation day on Oct 31 would not be celebrated until 1617, and was not set at that day for any reason related to All Saints' Day or All Hallows' Eve, instead it was put there because of the anniversary of the posting of the 95 theses. However, there is more continuity than discontinuity between the two days. Luther made very clear there was no distinction, all are saints due to God's amazing power of grace in the world. There are no more or less "righteous" people before God – all are one in Christ. That is our hope and joy during All Saints' Day. As we remember those who have gone before us, we are assured of the joy and glory in which they rest due to that same amazing power of grace, and that we can also hope for ourselves.

Worship with us on ZoomSundays at 11am

Central is offering a new kind of worship service on Zoom at 11am on Sundays. We will not simply be doing an abbreviated liturgy of the early service a few hours later, but this service will have components of a more contemplative and contemporary nature. It will remain true to our Lutheran identity, while presenting a unique style of worship. We will be having a Service of the Word that will be filled with reflection and meaning. This will include a Psalm of Lament as we reflect upon the pain and suffering of the world, prayers of thanksgiving for who God is in our lives, reflective readings, a Gospel reading and Homily, a contemporary affirmation of our Christian faith, a time for worshipers to offer prayers of concern as well as prayers of thanksgiving, and a sending benediction. It recognizes the value of a service on Zoom – that we can see one another as we worship together, and recognize who we are as community. It also encourages us to be reflective of who we are in relationship with God. We hope this will be a service rich in meaning and community and we invite you to come try it – even if you have already attended the earlier service – it will be a completely different experience for us as the people of God, one that seeks to connect us more deeply with God and with one another.

SERVE THOSE IN NEED... by preparing meals for First Place Family at the Annex

Since June 2020, members of Central have been preparing a weekly meal for the families at St. Vincent de Paul's First Place Family Annex, Night Shelter, (the Annex). The shelter houses up to 20 families overnight, who are working with local agencies to find permanent housing. This past summer they were at capacity and had to put some families in pallet shelters in the parking lot. On any given Monday, Central members will prepare food for between 30 and 50 people, including many small children. COVID-19 protocols do not allow us to cook at the site, therefore we prepare the meals at the church kitchen, and then deliver to the Annex. In the past 15 months, there have been a few dedicated members who regularly sign up to help. We can use more help. I often fill in the slot when no one has signed up to cook. The food is all provided free from the Eugene Mission. We pick up the food on Friday, to be prepared and delivered to the First Place Family Center Annex between 4:00 PM and 4:30 PM, the following Monday. erman pastor and theologian Dietrich ■Bonhoeffer is often celebrated as an example of a modern Christian martyr, and his participation in a plot to assassinate Adolf Hitler tends to be looked upon with favor. It is striking that Bonhoeffer himself deliberately sought to avoid justifying his actions. In these lectures we will explore what it means to do ethics in extraordinary times and consider what the witness of Bonhoeffer means for us today.



HEARTH & TABLE IS BACK!

2021 marks the 3rd year of the Hearth & Table program, a food-security ministry to our local college and university student neighbors. This program is designed to dovetail efforts of the Episcopal Student Food Pantry (hosted out of Grace Lutheran Church, down the road) by helping students translate their pantry ingredients into nutritious meals. Chef Ryan Josef-Maier designs recipes each week— often gluten-free and/or vegan— and works with students in the kitchen to strengthen their confidence and skill with cooking. Since COVID-19, meals



have been packaged to go, distributed with care by Christus House residents on Thursday nights. How ever, the full vision of this outreach includes a community meal around shared tables, connecting and laughing over "Would You Rather" questions and their shared joys and stresses as students.

We celebrate the campus connections enabled through this ministry. We are active participants at the UO Food Security Taskforce table; Chef Ryan is once more coordinating with The Duck Nest, a UO extension of the Health Center, in offering virtual cooking classes once a term; and we are returning partners to the Duck Corps service program through UO's Holden Center for Leadership and Community Engagement. Financial partnership for this program is supported both in our agency-partner status with FOOD for Lane County as well as an annual grant from the national Lutheran Campus Ministry.
