FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR LAURIE

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Sometimes it helps to know the context. Firstly, I happen to be writing this epistle on the Eve of Thanksgiving. Today, I am not only mindful of how much I have to be thankful for, I can't help but think about how much we have to be thankful for as a community of faith bound together as sisters and brothers in Christ. We are blessed with a rich history of faithful people who came before us. We are blessed with a beautiful sanctuary in which we are able to offer praise and thanksgiving to our gracious and merciful God. We are blessed to have four generations worshiping together under one roof. We are blessed with abundant riches with which to share the gospel, serve those in need, nurture faithful living, and love God and one another. Secondly, no matter what circumstances we find ourselves in during these in-between times of the "now and the not-yet," we have the assurance that our God is faithful and just, and abounding in steadfast love for us, and for all people, and all creation.

Sometimes it helps to know the context. In preparation for the season of Advent, I've been reading Luke, specifically the Gospel reading for the First Sunday of Advent where Jesus says, "There will be signs in the sun, the moon, and the stars, and on the earth distress among nations confused by the roaring of the sea and the waves. People will faint from fear and foreboding of what is coming upon the world, for the powers of the heavens will be shaken. Then they will see 'the Son of Man coming in a cloud' and great glory. Now when these things begin to take place, stand up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near" (Luke 21:25-28).

Sometimes it helps to know the context. Personally, I think it's safe to say that every generation since Jesus directed those words to his first disciples has attempted to predict the day and the hour of Jesus' return. That is to say, for over two millennia many have observed the world's brokenness as a sign that Christ's return is imminent. But what if there's another possibility? What if instead of focusing on the end times we are being encouraged to focus on what God desires from us in the present age, without so much as expending an ounce of energy on needless worry? What if Jesus' admonition was meant to be a call to action? Stand up. Raise your heads. Be on quard. Be alert. Keep awake.

Sometimes it helps to know the context. Sometimes. But not always. Wasting time trying to predict the end times or spending our finite time on earth worrying about such things only serves to distract us from living lives of gratitude to God for the blessings we have received. Blessings, which incidentally, are meant to be shared: to love and be loved, to forgive and be forgiven, to serve rather than be served. In other words, we can live in the confidence that God's will will be done, on earth as in heaven. In this context we have nothing to fear because our redemption is not only near, it is already here! Thanks be to God!

FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR BEN

Dear family of God at Central,

Advent is upon us and as we enter into the holidays, we celebrate with our families and we live in the joy of one another's presence. However, also at this time, we can't help but remember those who are not present. Some are not able to gather due to distance or circumstance, and some have been separated by death of those nearest to them. The holidays can be a very hard time for many people. The holiday season is a time both of joy and of grief – the complex mix of emotions that regularly fill our lives.

Our Tuesday evening Advent midweek series will be using the beloved Holden Evening Prayer Service, but our theme for our homilies this year will be entitled "The Light No Darkness Can Overcome." In it, we will be recognizing that there is darkness in the world. There is grief. The first week we will have time to recognize the loss of people nearest to us – those who are now in glory with Christ.

The next week, we will have time to recognize the loss of the world as we thought we knew it. Where the world around us was not what we expected it to be. When beloved institutions and traditions we have held tightly to in our life are no longer. The third week we will recognize the burdens and pain we carry in our own bodies. This will all be concluded on Friday, Dec. 20 with our special Blue Christmas Service. We recognize that the darkness that the Gospel of John talked about is very real – the losses we have are very real. Yet, we will also be expressing our hope in Christ. In the passage from Romans 8 above, we recognize with Paul that absolutely nothing will separate us from the light of Christ in our lives. The darkness will not overcome the light. Our hope and our joy are equally as real as the darkness itself and they compel us to rejoice in the Lord at all times – even amidst pain and grief. It will be a wonderfully meaningful Advent series this year – please join us.






